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## Be a Part of MoM Strategy and Planning for Mānoa Valley

**W**hat are the critical issues facing Mānoa in the next five years? What are the larger trends that will affect Mānoa's health and welfare? How can Mālama o Mānoa foster a sense of community? What are the opportunities that can be met to enhance the Mānoa neighborhood?

These are some of the questions to be addressed in Mālama o Mānoa's strategic planning process this year. The community is invited to participate Wednesday, March 11 at 7 p.m. at Mānoa Gardens Community Room. The public input will help define the strengths, opportunities, aspirations and action plans that will frame what Mālama o Mānoa's efforts will focus on. We'll also learn more about the planning process.

MoM needs the input of all community stakeholders to ensure that the strategic plan is focused on the right opportunities and strategic issues. Beginning in March, regular updates will be posted at [www.mal-amaomanoa.org](http://www.mal-amaomanoa.org) and an online survey will be conducted later this spring. MoM board members will also be holding interviews with individuals and focus groups on particular ideas to gather more input. Finally, the draft plan will be presented at a general membership meeting in late 2009 for further comment and refinement.

Since MoM's founding in 1992, it has provided an association of people connected by their aloha for the beauty, history and daily living experiences of Mānoa Valley. Its activities have focused on protecting and enhancing the special qualities of the valley, including its history, culture and relationships between members of the community.

The strategic plan will build on the organization's significant history and define how best to focus the passion, resources and energy of Mālama o Mānoa to be more effective, efficient, and responsive to the needs of the community. The result will be a new strategic plan that focuses our efforts and decisions about core programs and initiatives over the next five years.

Please join us as we determine MoM's path and role in protecting our Mānoa Valley.

## VOTING FOR MĀNOA NEIGHBORHOOD BOARD

This year, voting for the Neighborhood Board Elections will be conducted online. Budget cuts and ballot integrity were cited in making the change from mail-in voting. The technology used to transmit ballots uses encryption procedures similar to what banks use to transfer funds. By April 24, you will receive instructions in the mail, along with your own personal ID number. The ID number, with the last four digits of your Social Security Number (SSN), will allow you to access a Neighborhood Board ballot from any web-enabled computer. Voting ends on May 22, 2009. The new board members will start their two year terms on July 1st. ## Jill Laughlin

Jill has been a Mānoa resident for 25 years, and is a UH graduate. She has worked at Lyon Arboretum for 18 years and is now Education and Outreach Programs Manager. ## James Rumford

Jim Rumford, a 30-year resident of Mānoa, writes and illustrates children's books which are published nationally and internationally. Jim was a Peace Corps volunteer with his wife Carol in Chad and Afghanistan, where they both taught English. Later he taught at the National University of Rwanda and in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia. Upon returning to Hawaii in 1986, Jim founded Mānoa Press, which makes limited-edition handmade books. In 2001 Jim transformed a valley legend into a children's book, *Kahalaopuna, the Beauty of Mānoa*. Sales of the book helped Mālama o Mānoa pay the legal costs involved in the effort to keep the 38kv power lines off Wāhila Ridge. Over the years, the book has also provided the children of the valley with a story that connects them to the ancient past.



## Karen Kimura

Karen's roots in Mānoa begin with her mother-in-law, who has been a long-time resident. Karen spent her childhood years in the valley and attended Mānoa Japanese School, and she and her husband returned to Mānoa 10 years ago. She has been a realtor since 1980, and served on the Board of Directors for both the Honolulu Board of Realtors (becoming President) and the Hawaii Association of Realtors. She also worked in Ann Kobayashi's office at the legislature for several sessions. ## Honor Awarded for 1000 Trees Give-Away

**O**n January 28, 2009, the Council of the City & County of Honolulu honored Mālama o Mānoa with a certificate for its outstanding 1,000 Trees Giveaway event. Committee members Jeremy Lam, Linda LeGrande, Pat Avery and Thalya DeMott represented MoM at the ceremony. The biennial event was established in 2004 to contribute to the greening of Oahu--yard by yard, tree by tree--and has since enhanced the beauty of our island home by assisting in the protection of our invaluable watershed. At the 2008 event, over 1,800 trees of 30 different species were distributed, helped in part by Punahou School Academy Science Teacher Gail Peiterson and her students, who propagated more than 400 native seedlings, including 200 milo and 200 wiliwili.

## Join the Mānoa Stream Clean-Up, Saturday – April 11<sup>th</sup> *Help Celebrate Earth Month!*

Mālama o Mānoa's quarterly stream clean-up on Saturday, April 11, 2009, will be one of a dizzying array of activities sponsored by the City and County of Honolulu in recognition of Earth Month 2009.

The clean-up is a part of the City's "Adopt-a-Stream" program, run by the Department of Environmental Services. MoM has "adopted" the portion of the stream from the Woodlawn Drive bridge near Longs Drugs up to the Kahaloa Street bridge near Mānoa District Park. Watch for signs on the Woodlawn Drive bridge announcing the event - we'll meet there at 9 a.m. and be done by 11 a.m. For additional information, please contact *George Arizumi* at 988-5069.

Along with the MoM effort, other organizations are partnering with the City to conduct stream clean-ups elsewhere in Mānoa and in the Ala Wai Watershed on April 11. Additional Mānoa sites will be the Kolomono Ditch Bridge, led by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs; and in lower Mānoa at the ramp access to the stream on Koali Road, organized by the UH Environmental Law Society. And you won't want to miss the Armored Catfish Roundup at the E. Mānoa Road Bridge, organized by the DLNR's Division of Aquatic Resources and the Honolulu Aquarium Society.

After you've played around in the stream, head down to the Waikiki Aquarium for the Mauka to Makai Expo, a free all-day event featuring numerous activities, including interactive exhibits, displays, winning videos from the Earth Month Teen Video Contest, storytelling and crafts, and a fish (*moi*) release into the ocean behind the Aquarium.

These are only the activities on April 11<sup>th</sup>. ## New Publication: Homeowners' Guide To Nominating Historic Residences

Looking for information about putting your home on the Hawai'i State Register of Historic Places?

A new book is available that will answer your questions. Recently published by the Historic Hawaii Foundation, the "Guide to Nominating Residences to the Hawai'i State Register of Historic Places" is available as a free electronic resource and is posted online at [www.historichawaii.org](http://www.historichawaii.org).

The Guide includes an overview of the Hawai'i State Register of Historic Places; the benefits and responsibilities associated with historic designation; myths and facts about designation; how to research the history of your home; how to complete the nomination form; the review and approval process; and an illustrated glossary of architectural terms and styles, featuring examples from Hawai'i.

The State Register was established to recognize many types of cultural resources. In addition to residences, it also includes other sites that tell the rich and varied history of the Hawaiian Islands. Represented on the Register are places of commerce, agriculture, education, recreation, worship, community gathering, civic interaction and housing. The Guide was written specifically for registering historic houses, but much of the information is also relevant for other types of historic sites.

In addition to the free on-line version of the Guide, it is also available on CD (\$10) or hard copy (\$60 for the basic version; \$120 including appendices).
